The examples of allomorphy we have seen so far can be described in phonological terms, since they seem to emerge as a result of some natural phonological process. The devoicing of the plural and past tense suffixes is the result of assimilation, since it happens when the suffixes are preceded by voiceless consonants.

Allomorphy and Affix Competition cont'd •Example, the Dutch complex word stil-te “silence” is not realized as [stilətə]. •Thus, these rules must mention the morphological property [+ diminutive] in the description of their structure. This means they are morphologically conditioned phonological rules.

Any rule which effects a phonological change, and i) which need not follow any phonological rule ii) whose environment may be stated morphologically is a rule of allomorphy. Rules of allomorphy follow the rules of word formation and provide the input to the phonology.
